The DRCD confirmed an increase in funding for 2025 SICAP, however, finalised 2025 SICAP and New Arrivals allocation cannot be confirmed.

The Social Inclusion subgroup of the LDDC will meet on the week of December 16<sup>th</sup> to review the annual plan.

**ESF+ checks**

As SICAP is part funded though the European Social Fund, Financial and non-Financial Declaration must be uploaded to the EIST portal.

The ESF+ Financial Claim process is split into 2 phases. Phase 1 has now been completed by North Tipperary Development Company (NTDC) and South Tipperary Development Company including upload of the SSUC datasheets for 2021, 2022 and 2023, payslips for each eligible employee and an audit trail document in the form of a contract/job description.
