Mr. Anselm McGowan, District Administrator, commenced the meeting with the meeting prayer as Gaeilge in recognition of Seachtain na Gaeilge. 1.1 Disclosures/Conflicts of Interest

There were no matters notified to the Meetings Administrator.

2.1 Minutes of February Meeting of Tipperary-Cahir-Cashel Municipal District held on 23rd February, 2026

The minutes of the Tipperary-Cahir-Cashel Municipal District February meeting held on 23rd February, 2026 were adopted on the proposition of Councillor John Crosse seconded by Councillor Declan Burgess.

Matters arising from the minutes

There were no matters arising.

3.1 Housing Directorate Report

The Cathaoirleach welcomed Gillian Barry, Administrative Officer, Breda Ryan, Administrative Officer and Shaun Lonergan, Executive Engineer, Housing Section to the meeting. The team thanked the Cathaoirleach and taking their report as read were available to take questions from the Members.

Councillor Burgess requested an update in relation to the houses at Longfield, Boherlahan because he noted that work has stopped. He also requested details of the house types for the 20 units at Bregawn, Cashel. In relation to Coopers Lot he wanted to express his disappointment that Phase 2 has been allocated since September last year and the level of communication from Respond is unacceptable. He confirmed that no tenancy agreements are in place and households are extending notice to quit periods again and again. Families had hoped to be in before Christmas and had boxed up their belonging and are now living out of boxes. He also requested details on the locations for the Retrofit Programme for 2026. He acknowledged the great news that design teams have been appointed for Castlegreen, Cashel and Hollyford and requested a timeline for the next stage. He commended the housing team because before Boherclough Street there was no Council housing development in Cashel for two decades. Councillor Ryan (Shiner) noted that the Part 8 for Fr Matthew Street is being prepared and also agreed with Councillor Burgess in relation to Coopers Gate. She expressed her disappointment that there is no Council housing development in Tipperary Town despite there being 225 on the housing list. She also noted that there are 18 vacant houses at minor repair stage and it has been months since CBL has had a house in Tipperary Town. Councillor Hanna Hourigan also wanted to support Councillor Burgess and noted that there is a huge issue with AHBs and asked why the Council wasn't building our own housing stock. She said there is a lack of respect from the AHBs and advised that she will discuss it with the Director of Housing. Councillor Browne also wanted to echo what other Members are saying and noted that Respond Housing Association is providing dismissive answers. He also referred to issues with tenants in Castlegreen, noted that AHBs have to work within the guidelines set by the RTB and they seem to think they can ignore resident issue. He stated that a motion in relation to AHB should be brought before the Council, querying how much they are getting. He also asked are we getting value for money with Energy Retrofit Scheme because a number of houses just need small retrofit works rather than a deep retrofit. He also raised concerns in relation to the new rental sector reforms and the number of tenants who have got notice to quits. Councillor Crosse wanted to support his fellow Councillors because our challenges are increasing with homelessness and it is sad and upsetting to see people living in poor conditions. Councillor Marie Murphy thanked the housing team for the report and asked when the Part 8 for Clogheen will be published because she thought people would be living in their houses at this stage. He noted that there are 185 houses in the Department approval process and 796 approved applicants, therefore we need to build more housing. She acknowledged the 20% increase in Housing Adaptation Grants. Councillor Moloney wanted to support Councillor Browne in his motion because

there needs to be a serious look at the whole housing system particularly the income thresholds. He referred to young people finished college, working and still living at home. Young people are leaving for Australia because there is no support for 25 to 30 year old. He referred to the grant he received when he built his house if he met particular criteria he got £4,000. Councillor McGrath noted that she is part of that generation that can't get a mortgage and requested an update on the affordable housing survey. She noted that the HAP payment scheme isn't working and some people are financially worse off on HAP yet if they leave their accommodation, they will be removed from the list. Councillor Anglim referred to the social housing progress being made but also noted that there should be more supports for the squeezed middle. Councillor Hanna Hourigan wanted to support Councillor McGraths comment on HAP and referred to a Housing Conference which was well attended in Mayo and there was great engagement. She referred to a particular case where a mother and child were recently refused HAP because her accommodate doesn't meet the criteria. Councillor Browne noted that when HAP was brought in the cap was €560 but the average rent in Tipperary is now €1,500. He noted that some families are better off without HAP because they will go over the income limit if they take up employment. This national policy is keeping people from improving their circumstances and is anti-family. The Cathaoirleach noted that any motion in relation to AHBs would be best submitted at Plenary level.

In response Ms Barry shared the Members frustration in relation to Coopers Gate and the AHB hasn't been responsive and the Director of Housing has had to intervene. In relation to vacant houses and minor repairs she confirmed there are 19 units in the MD and 7 in Tipperary Town. She confirmed that the housing section has been advised of 50 notices to quit since the beginning of the year, which is high and they are engaging with the homeless prevention team. She confirmed that they are currently carrying out a stock condition survey and any work will be considered on a pro rata basis. She confirmed that 60 affordable houses will be provided on a phased basis in Clonmel, 30 in Moangarriff and 30 on the Coleville Road. They also have received 3 expression of interest for 60-70 units in Nenagh. She referred to the HAP queries and commented that no one should be disadvantaged from HAP. She noted that the definition of under and overaccommodated is outlined in the Act, however particular issues can be assessed on a case by case basis.

Mr Lonergan confirmed that there are 5, 2 bed turnkey units to be delivered in Boherlahan and they have been working with the developer. He confirmed that Bregawn are expected to be delivered by the end of the year. He advised the Members that there have been delays appointing Design Teams because a new Framework has to be developed. He confirmed that there will be an emphasis on Cashel and Clonmel in the 2026 Energy Efficiency Retrofit Scheme and noted that there has been delays due to staff changes within the section. He confirmed that the Part 8 for Donohill will be advertised the middle of next month and they are waiting on plans from the design team in relation to Fr Matthew Street. He acknowledge that it is disappointing that this is the only scheme being developed

in Tipperary Town, however they are constantly looking for suitable sites. Regarding the vacant houses he confirmed that there are 3 major repairs that the housing section are managing and these tend to be the more complex cases like 8 Glenview Square which is a protected structure. He acknowledged the delays with the Clogheen development and it is hoped that the Part 8 will go on display in the next 2/3 months. Councillor Murphy asked if this development could now be considered under the one stage process, however Mr Lonergan confirmed that they would need to have stage 3 completed by the end of the year. He confirmed that the one stage process would be of no benefit at this stage because planning and costs should be known before going to the one stage process.

Ms. Ryan confirmed that the Council does not have a remit to deal with tenant issues in Castlegreen. Councillor Ryan (Shiner) asked why the 16 units at Rosefield, Tipperary Town are taking longer than expected. Mr Lonergan confirmed that it is the same developer as Boherlahan and they have been engaging with him. Ms Barry confirmed that the Housing Section are meeting with all AHBs at the beginning of April.

The Cathaoirleach thanked the Housing Team and noted that An Chomhairle um Oideachas Gaelige have put forward suggestions for Irish names on more housing estates.

3.4 District Engineer's Report

Mr James Swords, District Engineer advised the Members that the road strengthening and recycling is ongoing. He confirmed that 2 of the 3 Bridge works commenced and preparation for Roads Maintenance has started. He confirmed that once he gets the funding allocation he hopes to bring the Red Roads and Development Levies before the Members for approval at the April meeting.

Councillor Moloney asked if the current fuel costs will affect the roads lengths that can be completed. Councillor Crosse thanked the District Engineer and all the engineers for the work given the extreme rain and flooding. He referred in particular to a CRM he logged on the poor condition of the road at Ayle and noted that the residents are very frustrated. Councillor John O'Heney noted that the weather is affecting the condition of the roads and asked when will the successful CIS applicants be notified. Councillor Liam Browne acknowledged all the work and thanked the team for their work despite the poor weather. He asked if the increasing price of materials will affect an already squeezed roads programme. Councillor Anglim acknowledge the great work and noted that a lot of black top has been completed recently. However, he asked that the work completed by some contractors would be assessed because some need to be redone. He noted that some of the roads due to be completed in 2026 were completed at the end of 2025, therefore there should be capacity for additional roads and asked is the unsuccessful CIS could be included. Councillor McGrath also acknowledged the great work, however referred to detour signage put in place by a contractor last week and they failed to advise the school bus of the detours and would not permit them through. It needs to be made clear to contractors that the school bus needs to be facilitated because children were left stranded. She also agreed with Councillor Anglim's proposal in relation to the CIS applications and asked if they could also be considered under the Red Roads. Councillor Murphy also agreed with Councillors Anglim and McGrath and noted that through roads should not be considered under the CIS scheme. Councillor Kennedy wanted to concur with previous speakers in relation to a road in Ayle and noted that it is not on the 3 year programme.

In response the District Engineer confirmed that prices are going to go up and it will impact on the work that can be done. In relation to the road in Ayle, he will follow up with Tim Kilmartin and hopefully in the next few weeks it will be dealt with, if the weather improves. He confirmed that the CIS letters have issued and once the contribution is paid it will be included on the work programme. In

relation to Councillor Anglim comment on the standard of work completed by some contractors, he confirmed that this was work completed by a 3rd parties under a road opening licence and this contractor has committed to return to address the problems. He also confirmed that through roads can be included on the next 3 year program. In relation to the detour signage he acknowledged that this shouldn't happen and he will address it.

Councillor Máirín McGrath referred to a particular road which is already in poor condition, significant drainage works have been completed and specially asked the Director could this road be included in the Red Road this year before the road deteriorates further. Councillor Murphy asked what was the criteria for prioritising CIS applications, more landowners, more land or condition of the road because she has an application with 11 or 12 houses and it hasn't been prioritised.

In response, the District Engineer confirm that when considering the Red Roads, if he has a regional or a tertiary road requiring work, the regional road will be prioritised. Regarding the CIS scheme he agreed to share the marking scheme and noted that if a road has more than 10 houses it should score high. Mr James Murray advised the Members that in relation to rising forecourt prices, the Council has fuel storage and 15 vehicles using fuel cards. Therefore, at present the forecourt prices are not having a significant impact, however if the conflict continues it will cause an issue.

The Cathaoirleach referred to the last 6 months of considerable rain and noted that the good condition of the roads is down to the good management of the roads programme and he thanked the team.

3.5 District Administrator's Report

The District Administrator's Report was circulated to the Members with the agenda and taken as read the District Administrator advised that he was available to take questions.

Councillor Annemarie Ryan (Shiner) commented that it is great to see the toilets in Market Yard open and she asked if they came in under budget and if the water station and bike rack have been installed. She also asked what is the cost to use the toilets, the opening times and if the units are designated. Councillor Crosse also wanted to be associated with the comments and commended the contractor for his work.

In response, Frank Cussen, Project Engineer confirmed that the public toilets are open 8.30 a.m. to 7.00 p.m., however the changing places is 24 hour access with a RADAR key and the facility will be registered on the Changing Places website. The public toilets are designated one male, one female and one universal access toilet with baby changing facilities. The water dispenser is operational but the bike rack and EV charging unit will be installed by the end of the week. He confirmed that the project was completed under budget and cost €180,000.

5.1 Councillor John Crosse (Ref ID 3116)

That this Municipal District write to Iarnród Éireann requesting that they attend to the pedestrian footbridge at Station Road near the Abbey school in Tipperary Town to ensure its preservation and prevent it falling into greater appearance of dereliction.

Reply

Subject to the approval of the Elected Members, the Municipal District will write to Iarnród Eireann seeking engagement on the matter.

5.2 Councillor John Crosse (Ref ID 3117)

That this Municipal District call on the N74 Project Team to address all the ongoing public lighting issues arising out of the works carried out on the N74 despite some of these being secondary issues affecting nearby estates.

Reply

The N74 Fr Mathew Street Project Team confirms that the previously reported public lighting issues in Avondale Crescent have now been fully addressed and are functioning as intended.

The Contractor for the N74 Scheme is continuing to progress a substantial list of snagging items, which includes some outstanding public lighting issues associated with the works on the N74. These items have been logged as part of the project close-out process, and the Contractor is working to resolve them within the current snagging programme.

5.3 Councillor Marie Murphy (Ref ID 3118)

That in the interest of Health & Safety, additional measures are put in place outside Scoil Teampall Toinne in Ballyporeen to ensure the safety of the children attending the school, the teachers and the parents when they are dropping off and collecting their children.

Reply

The Area Engineer will carry-out an inspection of the location to consider appropriate control measures to reduce the practice of illegal parking in the vicinity of the school.

The Cathaoirleach requested that consideration be given to opening the graveyard in Cashel for one hour under the supervision of the caretaker to facilitate anyone who wants to drive in. The District Administrator advised that the risks would have to be assessed because the vehicular access wasn't intended for two way traffic.

This concluded the business of the Municipal District meeting.
