1. Approval of Draft Agenda

2. Confirmation of Minutes of Tipperary LCDC Meeting dated the 16th of February 2026 & Matters Arising (Decision)

The minutes of the Tipperary LCDC meeting held on the 16th of February 2026 were agreed on the proposal of Pat Carroll and seconded by Mike Edwards.

3. Presentations

3.1 Tipperary Volunteer Centre (TVC)

Derek Fanning from TVC gave a detailed presentation on the works of TVC and their actions within the LECP.

- Mike Edwards thanked Derek and told the LCDC that the Garda Vetting system is working well thanks to the training that has been provided by TVC.
- Stephanie O’Callaghan thanked Derek and TVC who also helped Stephanie and CYPSC with their actions in the LECP.
- Michael Murraray and Isabel Cambie also thanked Derek and TVC for all their support.

4. LEADER 2023-2027

Targeted Call: The Green Economy

Michael Murray explained to the LCDC that the call was oversubscribed. The IEC recommended two options on how to proceed. Option 1 was to come up with the shortfall of €15,000 and Option 2 was to apply a 4.01998% reduction to each project’s grant allocation. Michael explained that Option 1 was not feasible and he sought approval for Option 2. This was proposed by John O’Shaughnessy and seconded by Pat Carroll.

4.1 NTDC CEO Report (Decision)

With Option 2 been the preferred option by the LCDC, the North Tipperary Development Company Income and Expenditure Report was noted.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Displacement: 	Nore Agri's expansion is designed to complement rather than replace existing service providers. While some wood-chipping contractors operate in the region primarily tree-surgery firms and general agricultural contractors most of these businesses offer chipping as one element of a broader service (tree cutting, site clearance, felling), rather than as a specialist biomass-oriented process. As identified in the business plan, Nore Agri is a niche enterprise focused on sustainable circular-economy processing of green waste, compliant recycling, high-grade chip production, and local biomass-supply development. This distinguishes it structurally, operationally, and economically from existing providers.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Innovation 	The project implements a fully circular biomass model that converts local waste wood into renewable fuel. It introduces scalable processing capacity to rural Tipperary, enabling local chip supply for heating systems, reducing reliance on imported fuels and fossil energy. It supports Irelands Climate Action plan and CAP 2023-2027 objectives for sustainable land management.

If they were to do so, it would take many more years to complete. The extra grant aid available from this programme makes this a manageable investment from their perspective.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Displacement: 	There is no displacement, this is a farm tourism business established over 27 years ago and has been an award-winning pioneer in the sector and the only farm tourism offering in the area.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Innovation 	Fuchsia Lane Farm has developed as a hub for peer-to-peer learning on sustainability and farm diversification. The site provides a demonstration model for other rural dwellers, communities, and enterprises, showcasing practical actions that can be replicated to advance Tipperary's transition to a greener economy.

- Pat Carroll asked if there are other grants available for this kind of a project for example SEAI grants? Michael Murray told the LCDC that there were not eligible.

- John O'Shaughnessy asked if the project has sought grant from the SEAI and suggested the project be deferred until clarification is received regarding eligibility under SEAI funding.
- Pat Carroll asked how big a system the company needs to run the factory. Pat said that funding should not be granted for a bigger system than required to ensure the company is not making money from selling power back to the national grid on the back of a grant aided project. Pat recommended that the project be deferred until clarification is received on same.
- Katie Frazer agreed with Pat Carroll.
- Fiona Crotty said the application was submitted in September 2025 and this must be taken into consideration.
- Michael Murray suggested this be discussed at subgroup level.
- It was agreed that the project be deferred until further clarification was received.
- Cora Morrissey said it would be helpful if Expressions of Interest (EOI) are sent to the LAG as they are received by the LDCs. It was agreed to discuss this at the next subgroup meeting.

Description:	To develop an existing farm shop to provide a wider range of local artisan produce, in particular from the Tipperary Food Producers

	Network. Local and short food supply chains are an integral part of a green economy and this project supports that. The operating rules Section 6 expressly permit funding for farm shops.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deadweight 	The promoter has stated that there are many investment needs across the business, and that without LEADER grant aid, the Farm Shop element would not go ahead.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Displacement: 	There are no existing farm shops of similar nature within the locality or region. One of the aims of this farm shop is to support local food producers with an outlet for their products. The promoter was a founder member of Cahir Farmers Market on a Saturday which they still regularly attend. About 1.5km away is an unmanned farm stall with honesty box, operated by a local farmer selling his regeneratively produced salads. However, this proposal is not in competition with either of these, and indeed the promoter hopes to incorporate those salads into the farm shop to supplement the roadside sales.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Innovation 	The Apple Farm is unique within Ireland, as Ireland's only large commercial fruit farm that sells the majority of its produce through an on site farm shop. In order to improve the viability of the farm and the farm-shop, improving the product range by selling foods produced locally will increase average visitor spend, and will also increase footfall.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reasonableness of costs: 	The promoter sought at least five quotations for each element of the project. 3 were received for the baler, two for the door, 2 for the construction element, 2 for refrigeration and 1 for the EPOS. In each case the quotations were scored according to a matrix involving the quality of the proposal, track record of the tenderer and value for money

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Innovation 	All woodworking industries need effective dust collection solutions, and the proposed wood dust extraction equipment is more energy efficient and enhanced in terms of industrial air pollution control, than what they have currently in operation on site.

The projections for 2024–2028 appear reasonable and achievable based on actual trading performance. The promoter currently employs 21 people (20 FTE). Most staff live around Carrick-on-Suir, spending in local shops etc., and thus adding value to the local economy.

This project has been developed by a well established family-run rural enterprise who identified the need to undertake sustainability enhancements re energy and waste management in their business. It is thus a bottom-up approach with significant innovation.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deadweight 	The promoter has stated that they do not have the resources to complete the proposed works to the building without grant support. Any existing reserves are designated for other works on the now 25-year-old building.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Displacement: 	There is no similar building in Tipperary Town offering office space to small businesses and organisations. Indeed, because of demand for space, the promoter is considering developing a second location in the town.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Innovation 	The project is part of a wider building retrofit which is being undertaken by the promoter on a phased basis, to bring the building up to a high standard regarding energy efficiency and general comfort. The financial savings will help to maintain the rents as competitive, as the overheads will be reduced. This is important for the small businesses who are tenants and for people who want to use the remote working hub.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reasonableness of costs: 	The promoter retained the services of the Tipperary Energy Agency to manage the tendering process. They requested quotations from 5 potential suppliers and received three. These were scored and the highest score and lowest price tender was Premier Electrics

Michael Murray said sustainability of sheds is an issue. Funding Updates

9.1 CLÁR

CLÁR funding was announced by Minister Calleary on 9 March. Ten additional DED areas in Tipperary have been included as eligible under the programme. Tipperary County Council may submit a total of fourteen applications, consisting of twelve applications valued between €5,000 and €65,000, along with a further two applications that may be submitted for up to €100,000. Expressions of Interest are to be received by TCC by 22 May for evaluation. A webinar will be held in collaboration with Tipperary PPN to assist groups with any queries in advance of submitting applications.

9.2 LEP 2026 grant recommendations

Fiona Crotty presented the LEP Grants 2026 for decision. She said the average grant sought was €1,030.44 with nine less than €500. It is proposed to award 304 grants totaling €240,984 under the scheme.

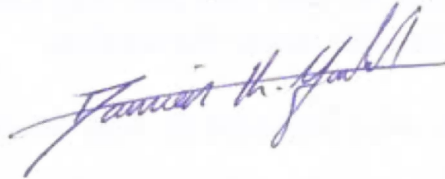
